March 16th: The Regional Council is consulting on its plans for Land and Public Transport containing \$6.6b of projects. What improvements do you want? Come and have your say and we will support you in our submission.

- Does our railway justify building 6-storeys next door to you?
- Do you want more lanes to the planes?
- What would make you shift from your car to buses or trains?
- What do you want done to make our roads safer?
- How easy is it for you to walk or cycle to work?

Come to our public meeting and learn about the Regional Council plans and the Let's Get Wellington Moving (LGWM) project. Daran Ponter, Chairman of the Regional Council will speak and answer questions, and our City Mayor and ward councillors have also been invited. Bill Guest from Karori will present a resident's view of LGWM.

Thanks to representatives of the neighbourhood, Department of Conservation, Greater Wellington Regional Council, and Wellington Water we learned how to keep our freshwater environments healthy to enable our unique taonga, such as fish, insects and birds, to survive in our new normal. Principally that means not putting pollutants into our storm water: no paint at all and be sensitive about where we wash our vehicles.

Update: Wellington City Spatial Plan

February: Wellington City has published its analysis of the feedback received during the consultation on the Draft Spatial Plan, for which we held a public meeting in Cashmere Avenue School and another was held in Khandallah Presbyterian Church.

The split between those in favour of intensification and those who opposed it was reasonably even. Respondents who opposed it feared losing the character of established suburbs. Three waters infrastructure and transport infrastructure were seen to be struggling to cope with existing demand. Come to our next event to have your say on Transport.
